Darnick Village Development Trust Representation, on behalf of Trustees and Members. for Scottish Borders Council's Local Development Plan (LDP) regarding Development in Darnick

Darnick Village Development Trust (DVDT) is a charitable organisation whose purpose includes 'the advancement of environmental protection or improvement'. DVDT opposes the proposed development site at Darnlee (ADARM005) and the potential long-term expansion to the west of Darnlee (unclassified).

DVDT believes neither scheme meets the LDP's stated sim to "protect, and where possible, enhance the built and natural environment, including access to and enjoyment of these resources" and both are to the detriment of the built and natural environment in Darnick, as well as having an impact on adjoining settlements. These schemes would lead to over-development of the village and put additional pressure on already stretched local services, such as education and health.

## 1. Darnick Village Development Trust opposes the proposed development site at Darnlee

(ADARN005)

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Whilst no planning application has been submitted, we vigorously oppose the development on the

We are not confident that the Site Requirements outlined in the LDP can be met satisfactorily, given the unnecessary tree felling at Tweedbank and the insensitive and inappropriate use of building materials in recent developments in the village.

In recent years there have been developments - on a mix of private and publicly owned land - at Waverley Gardens, Gilroy Gardens and Coatburn Green, which have contributed to the loss of green space within the village. The development of Darnlee would exacerbate this and together with the loss of trees within and along the site boundaries this does not align with SBC's declared climate emergency. Trees are recognized as being critical in the take up of carbon dioxide and it is not possible to replace mature trees in short periods of time. We have already lost significant woodland around Tweedbank, which is a very significant issue for birdlife, other wildlife and wildlife corridors, which is a very significant issue for birdlife, other wildlife and wildlife corridors, particularly given the earlier loss of habitats with the building of the bypass and the hospital.

Darnlee forms an important and historic entrance to the village of Darnick. As a listed building in a parkland setting within the conservation area of Darnick, the site contributes positively to the streetscape. The land is often used for grazing which would be lost if the land was developed. As noted in the LDP, the Darnick Conservation Area is characterised by a number of buildings fronting directly onto the main street and the loss of open space will be to the detriment of the character of the village.

Additional housing places a burden on the already high levels of traffic through the village, where there are a number of constricted areas. There is already a problem with parking in Darnick as many of the older properties have no parking provision. The loss of and during the development phase there would be an impact due to the volume of trade and during the development phase there would be an impact due to the volume of trade vehicles. Broomilees Road is already narrow and without a pavement and provides access to the nearby farms. Access to the site will have a negative impact on the safe use of this and neighbouring roads and junctions.

## 2. Darnick Village Development Trust opposes the Potential long-term expansion to the west of Darnice

DVDT was surprised and concerned to learn that 'there is potential in the longer term to expand the village to the west of Darnlee.' There was no mention of this in the most recent Major Issues Report and minimal information has been provided in this may be proposed for it, the DVDT strongly opposes any development of the community woodland, known as 'Big Shunter's Wud', which lies adjacent to and to the west of Darnlee.

The community woodland was established in 1998 after consultation with the villagers. It had previously been poor grazing land left over from the development and building of the bypass and the new road layout as a result of re-alignment of the roadways. The woodland has been invested in over this time to provide a community space for the enjoyment of all villagers as well as others, including schools. It has been a particularly important recreation space during Covid lockdowns and has attracted funding from The Fallago Trust to enhance the space. It has been used for open educational purposes (playschool and primary school on occasion) and used by voluntary groups, including those working in wellbeing such as Branching Out.

This land also forms a greenspace between Darnick and the neighbouring settlement of Tweedbank. Development of this space would undermine SBC's anti-coalescence policy which determines to keep the settlements distinct. The site is also within the designated battlefield area.

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The loss of accessible greenspace and wildlife habitat, increased pressure on traffic volume and parking, overdevelopment of the village and expansion of the village boundary and the negative contribution on the National Scenic Area mean that this land should not be considered for development and should be designated and protected as a formal Green Space within the village.
