Regular mobile patrols carried out throughout the Borders. Some patrols are intelligence led in relation to disrupting drugs supply or responding to information received regarding vehicles being driven by disqualified or uninsured drivers. Officers have made a number of drugs recoveries, issued traffic tickets and reported offenders. Mobile patrols also cover more rural areas that have been subject to thefts of Quad bike and agricultural machinery.

Through mobile patrols and static road checks several motorists have been charged with road traffic offences with fixed penalty tickets being issued and drivers reported to court. Significant work has been done with young drivers in the Borders to increase their understanding of how their driving behaviours can have a negative impact on their local communities and when required, enforcement action has been taken

All Borders towns have received attention in relation to dangerous and inconsiderate parking with 252 parking tickets issued this quarter. Officers have been completing timed parking in our Main/High Streets in response to concerns raised and this as a whole has been welcomed. The CAT continue to liaise with the local authority with regards to unclear markings and signs etc.

The CAT have continued to conduc static road checks on many of our arterial routes, working closely with Roads Policing colleagues in carrying out some of these static road checks. The visibility of Police conducting these types of checks has a positive effect on road safety with speed guns often being used to monitor speeds in the smaller towns and villages.

The CAT and other Police Colleagues carried out a significant number of searches under warrant throughout the Borders where drugs supply was suspected and in response to information passed received from concerned members of our communities. Class A, B and C recoveries of significant value have been made and several people were charged with supply offences. A significant quantity of cash was also seized, which is suspected to be the proceeds of drug dealing.
