The request received from West Linton Village Centre Trust for a ten-year lease, agreed in February 2023, was concluded in 2023/24

A lease to Coldstream Community Larder for the annex building of Coldstream Primary School was agreed in Q1 of 2023/24. It is expected that using this building will give the Larder more visibility and increase the number of people benefitting from the service. This lease was dealt with outwith the formal process set out in the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015.

A lease to The Hub Innerleithen CIC for the former toilets on Hall Street, Innerleithen develop changing facilities, showers, and an external bike wash for cyclists. This lease was dealt with outwith the formal process set out in the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015.

The shed and land at Denholm Primary Schools was sold to neighbouring Denholm Village Hall. This sale was dealt with outwith the formal process set out in the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Act 2015.

Section Three – Promotion and Equality

3.1 Please provide information on any action you have taken to promote the benefits of asset transfer or any support provided for communities to engage with the Asset Transfer Request process.

During 2023/24 Scottish Borders Council took part in a Place Making Peer workshop to raise awareness of asset transfer, the process and support available. This resulted in one immediate contact relating to a Common Good asset. Discussions are at an early stage and progressing as part of the Place Making process with the relevant Common Good committee.

SBC agreed a process for estates rationalisation, optimisation and decarbonisation recognising that a number of Council buildings play a significant role within communities across the Scottish Borders, particularly those that community groups use regularly or those that have a significant civic presence. As part of this work communication and engagement processes were put in place.

Information on the website has been reviewed to provide a self-help guide for communities in the initial stages of exploring asset transfer. This includes information about what will be required of a community transfer body, the asset transfer journey and sign posting to support available outwith Scottish Borders Council.

Communities continue to be updated, through the Councils locality-based Area Partnerships, about asset transfer applications and their progress.

SBC's Community Engagement team promote asset transfer as part of their interaction with communities. We are currently working with our Community Learning and Development team to raise their awareness of asset transfers and build their capacity to support committees with asset transfer ambitions.

The ongoing Place Making work is engaging and supporting communities in discussions about assets in their areas.

3.2 In particular what action has been taken to support disadvantaged communities to engage with the asset transfer process?

Locality based Community Engagement Officers are proactive in their engagement with disadvantaged groups and are able to identify, provide and sign post to support available for communities.
