# Foreword

The UK Shared Prosperity Fund (SPF) was introduced by UK Government in December 2022. The purpose of the fund was to help bridge the gap previously offered by European Union funding before Brexit took place in January 2020.

The fund focussed on 4 strands with the aim of levelling up all parts of the UK through boosting productivity, pay, jobs and living standards as well as improving services and empowering communities.



Local Authorities (LAs) were tasked with administering the fund across all areas in England, Scotland, Wales and Northern Ireland. LAs had discretion to deliver SPF through direct award, open grant funding, commissioning, procurement of service provision or inhouse provision.

International Tartans; HALO - A Living Museum for Future Generations; Fleece & Fibre Hub; Eyemouth Harbour – Masterplan for "South East Scotland Gateway"; Land Based Campus Development – Phase 1: Business Case In December 2022, Scottish Borders was informed by UK Government that an allocation of £5,369,972 had been awarded. Over the 2 year period from January 2023 to end March 2025, a total of £5,354,166 was utilised. £4,534,069 was awarded to 40 projects across Scottish Borders delivering activities in the Community & Place, Supporting Local Business and People & Skills strands. A further £605,299 was awarded to Multiply and £214,798 covered management/administration undertaken by the LA.

Recommendations for funding were made by the Place Partnership Advisory Panel for Community & Place and Supporting Local Business projects and the Local Employability Partnership for People & Skills and Multiply. Decisions on funding were then made by the Director of Resilient Communities and the Director of Finance & Procurement in discussion with the Economic Development Elected Members Reference Group.



The Place Partnership Advisory Panel is made up of local organisations with expertise across a wide section of community and business strategies for the area including representatives from Scottish Borders Council, Live Borders, Borders College, South of Scotland Enterprise, Borders Community Action, Registered Social Landlords and Scottish Borders Chamber of Commerce.

The Local Employability Partnership is made up of local organisations with expertise in development of employability skills such as Scottish Borders Council, Skills Development Scotland, South of Scotland Enterprise, Scottish Borders Chamber of Commerce, Scottish Borders Social Enterprise Chamber, Borders College, Heriot Watt University, NHS Borders, Registered Social Landlords, Developing Young Workforce and Borders Community Action.

The total £5,354,166 administered is broken down as follows:-

Where possible, identified project underspends were utilised through additional funding for capital projects which had incurred unexpected increases in cost of contractors or materials. This ensured capital projects were able to fully complete by the programme deadline of 31st March 2025.

The small underspend of £15,806 could not be utilised via projects as this was money directly associated to Multiply which could not be utilised elsewhere under the rules of the programme.

# Project Summary:

The Active Leisure project in Newcastleton is part of a larger effort to create a sustainable rural economy. It focuses on improving physical, cultural, and social spaces in the community, with an emphasis on outdoor activities like mountain biking and walking. The goal is to build on the area's natural capital to attract tourists and generate income while keeping the control of assets local.

Phase 1 involved creating new outdoor facilities and improving green spaces to make Newcastleton a popular destination for outdoor recreation. The project is designed to benefit the local economy by tapping into tourism in nearby areas like Northumberland and Cumbria, which see over 1.25 million visitors a year.


The project has improved local trails and paths, including scenic walks, woodland and views. Collaboration with Forestry England now boosts cross-border tourism, and future plans include more trail expansions. Efforts are also underway to develop housing, social enterprises, and reduce flooding. Although plans for an Active Leisure Hub were paused due to high costs, the overall goal is to make Newcastleton a vibrant, attractive place for both residents and visitors.

Through this project, we've seen a significant impact: facility usage has increased by an estimated 50%, footfall has risen by 75%, benefiting local shops and restaurants, and the use of paths shows a 100% increase.

# Project Summary:

This project enabled provision of a VR experience, a unique offering in the Scottish Borders, that will immerse the visitor in Roman Iron Age Scotland through films and VR. A new Hands-on-History experience was also launched in which participants have a unique opportunity to handle authentic Roman artefacts guided by knowledgeable staff, bringing the story of Trimontium to life through storytelling, artefacts, and visual imagery.

A marketing campaign has also publicised the museum's new Heritage and Landscape Observatory. In the first year this space has been optimised to receive group visitors and offer an increasing number of engagement programmes, activities, and volunteering opportunities.

Workshops, talks and community programmes are also provided where participants can acquire work experience, technical and life skills, while fostering an open and safe space for socialisation and wellbeing.

# **Project Summary:**

This project had been 7 years in the making and endured a number of setbacks including Covid and rocketing building costs requiring a pause for additional fund raising.

The project eventually commenced in December 2024 bringing enormous benefits to the village with a permanent home for the community owned and run village shop. It's also provided improved hall space with a new catering kitchen and modern toilet facilities plus new meeting room which also has remote working facilities including fibre broadband.

The facility will greatly enhance the village and surrounding areas. It has been badly needed for many years.

# Project Summary:

The project refurbished the west wing of the Haining Grade A Listed palladian Mansion House. Part of a total renovation of the house, the west wing phase included the installation of a commercial catering kitchen, a platform lift to all floors to provide full accessibility, toilets on all floors and a new link building to provide a link between the listed building and a state of the art marquee.

Significant structural work had to be undertaken including demolition of the original annexe and installation of new steel beams and stabilisation of bison concrete floors on the upper levels.


To enable public access, significant fireproofing was undertaken including upgrading of all doors and installation of fire proof doors into the kitchen and new link building, as well as fire proofing ceilings and the lift shaft. Due to the listed status of the house all ventilation, piping and drainage had to be concealed within the internal structure so as not to affect the external appearance of the building.

# **Project Summary:**

This project builds on the successful CRF pilot, 'Bridging the Gap - Knowledge Transfer' project which built community capacity to upskill green skills and support decarbonisation of village halls/community facilities. There are 96 community spaces across the Borders overall and 16 village halls were ready for the next stage of capital development, with some already having started their journey. No halls are at the same stage of progression to net zero, and each individual Energy Audit/ Decarbonisation Plan identified required capital development unique to each individual hall.

This project created a fund for Village Halls to access to unlock potential, including Energy Assessments; Insulation Windows & Doors upgrades; Secondary glazing; Solar panels; Batteries; Air Source Heat Pumps and Digital Infrastructure. The project was co-ordinated by BCA working closely with the Federation of Village Halls.

# Project Summary:

The construction of the hub and adjoining outdoor teaching space enabled categorisation and storage of our fleeces and a concerted space in which to host significantly larger workshops (up to 25-30), including school groups, who can learn about fibre processing from dirty fleece through to finished garment. Our fleece & fibre workshop programme places emphasis on traditional hand-processing techniques and the use of our own homegrown alpaca and sheep fibres, alongside donated fleeces of different breeds.

Our programme focuses on environmentally friendly ways to create finished products from natural, locally sourced materials and our natural dye garden also contributes to more eco-friendly ways to produce colour for our fleeces and donated fibre. This programme is aligned with the NHS's "Six Ways to be Well" framework. The build has been a sustainable one, using responsibly sourced renewable materials. The roof of both the hub and the canopy is loaded with solar panels, as we aim for carbon neutrality.



# Project Summary:

Partnership project between Scottish Borders Council, three RSL's and Abundant Borders to set up a community food growing area in an unutilised area of Orchard Park, Kelso. Following community consultation on site and door to door, a garden was constructed reflecting the ideas and suggestions of local people. Abundant Borders provided liaison with schools, community groups and community members and raised beds and benches have been commissioned on site.

The garden officially opened on 26th April 2024. Growing workshops were subsequently hosted by Abundant Borders in May and will carry on indefinitely to upskill local community members in horticulture and use of produce to encourage healthy eating. The project partner agreed to keep the garden and add it to their portfolio of gardens that they manage in Kelso.

# **Project Summary:**

The project focussed on the delivery of strategic and tactical improvements to mountain biking (MTB) facilities, infrastructure, and support across the Scottish Borders. This included areas such as the MTB Trails themselves through increased community led stewardship and volunteering opportunities, the businesses supporting (and supported by) mountain biking, events that drew in additional visitors, increased inclusivity, and support for development of the sport.

Further to this it provided expert knowledge, practical delivery, and teacher training into 3 high schools. This included delivering sessions to disengaged pupils, developing a new Nat 5 that will support young people to develop careers in this key pillar of the Scottish Borders economy.

- 83 people attended training sessions
- 51 people gained a qualification
- 55 businesses and 17 organisations gained non financial support.

# Project Summary:

The project appointed a professional company to produce a fundraising feasibility review and fundraising plan to provide a clear narrative and case to support discussion with potential fundraisers for a Gunsgreen House capital project.

This enabled submission of Expressions of Interest to 3 key funding sources and approval to proceed to stage one development of one full application process. The project also included engagement with local community groups, staff and local agencies to develop the initial thinking and scope, involvement in wider local community initiatives, provision of volunteering opportunities.

# Project Summary:

In July 2024, Scottish Borders Council implemented a Taxi bus pilot in the Selkirkshire locality. The purpose of the Taxi bus was to link in communities that have no access to public transport, into the wider bus network for onward travel.

Over the 8 months of the pilot, the communities of Lilliesleaf and Ettrickbridge had access to the wider bus network in the Scottish Borders through a mixture of daytime and evening services which also provided connections to the Borders General hospital and Bowhill House.

The postcodes that benefitted from the Selkirk pilot were TD6 and TD7

Unfortunately, driver shortages and lack of available operators prevented the pilots in Newcastleton and Jedburgh taking place however the Selkirk pilot has provided valuable data which will now be used to help shape future service provision.

# **Project Summary:**

This project carried out preliminary design work for the Reston to Chirnside section of the proposed Borders Greenway multi-use path from Eyemouth to Tweedbank. The primary objectives of the wider project include connecting communities, encouraging sustainable tourism and promoting green businesses.

External consultants delivered landowner mapping and engagement, preliminary path design, inspections of bridges, drainage strategy, ecological appraisal and construction cost estimates. The Borders Greenway Steering group, consisting of volunteers representing different community groups across the Borders, has directed this project and took the lead on a number of community engagement and outreach events, including community consultation meetings, group walks and local school visits.

Overall, through the plethora of community engagement events and survey data, the response to the project has been overwhelmingly positive.


# **Project Summary:**

Al Navigator was a short course designed to introduce Artificial Intelligence (AI) to small businesses in the Scottish Borders. The course comprised of five modules, covering how to use AI tools and techniques across different aspects of a small business, including sales, marketing, operations and data management. Each module was delivered by a different AI expert, providing diverse perspectives from fellow business owners, consultants and technology leaders. Participants from ten businesses were exposed to many new tools and frameworks to help guide sustainable and efficient implementation of AI across the business.

To deliver this course, CodeBase's software development team created a customised learning management system (LMS) so participants could access course content in an accessible, streamlined and engaging way. All course content will be available for participants to access and use until September 2025, to ensure participants have time to implement their learnings now the programme has concluded.

Consultation with the Head of Knowledge and Research at CS has confirmed that this is the only available source for the unique aggregated data and analysis required by the project. Through this project, the TAA has expanded their analysis to allow them to build a more detailed and robust picture of audience engagement across the region, incorporating drive time and market penetration to provide audience profiles for each of the local authority areas.

A Cycle Tourism Strategic Framework and Cruise Management Strategy has also been produced.

# Project Summary:

This project was required to meet the need of a potential largescale harbour re-development project which had reached first round consideration by Scottish Government to address low port capacity in Scotland. This is a partnership project with Scottish Borders Council and South of Scotland Enterprise Agency. The production of a port masterplan follows the Scottish Transport Appraisal Guidance (STAG) methodology, which has stakeholder consultation and participation as a central component. Stakeholder and community consultation showed strong backing for the masterplan.

The masterplan proposals, supported offshore renewables, fishing, and marine tourism, fitting with the 'Centre of Excellence for marine economy' and 'First port of call from land and sea' and 'Net Zero' eco-port from the communities adopted 'Vision 4 Eyemouth' as well as skills development in the area.

Locally, the potential port development will drive the transformational change required to deliver the Wellbeing Economy with green jobs and skills and circular supply chain development.

Since the development of the Masterplan, a further £1.8M funding has been secured through the Community Regeneration Partnership which will enable development of the Outline Business Case and technical feasibility investigations to be undertaken.

100% positive outcomes were achieved for the pilot delivered between Oct 22-May 23. The central mission was to improve life-chances for priority target groups to support them to learn new skills including core such as communication, decision-making, teamwork, numeracy, creativity and basic digital literacy alongside bespoke tailoring, product design and enterprise.

This work broke cycles of low aspiration and poverty, bringing some of the most vulnerable women and young people together in a supported environment to build confidence and personal resilience to determine longerterm aspirations; developing life and career goals.



# **Project Summary:**

Archaeology Scotland along with local community groups, schools, community organisations and individuals have been carrying out community led archaeological fieldwork in the Rule Water area of the Scottish Borders. The project revolved around providing first-hand experience of archaeology, opening horizons and learning some new skills in a new environment for a variety of people. The project focussed on the exploration, investigation, research and sharing of stories, narratives and histories of late medieval defended settlements in the valley. Sites at Fulton Tower, Bonchester Townhead, Bedrule Castle and to a lesser extent at Swanshiel fit into the development of defended settlements in the valley and are associated with the Border Reivers, rough wooing and other conflicts.

The project has sought to look at themes of conflict and settlement archaeologically and with benefit to the broader community. Activities included, archaeological surveying, geophysics, laser scanning, dry stone dyking and excavation.

# **Project Summary:**

This project produced a feasibility study to address dereliction of historic buildings and lack of local traditional skills to repair and maintain these types of buildings. By designing a model for the restoration of historic buildings in rural towns this would assist in tackling the growing crisis in traditional skills.

Through desk-based research, targeted surveys, interviews with local tradespeople, and meetings with key stakeholders including Historic Environment Scotland, Borders College, and Eyemouth High School, we have designed a phased progressive training programme with a Pre-Apprenticeship offer followed by Modern Apprentice placements with local contractors. The curriculum is designed around the restoration of between 2-5 identified historic buildings, delivered by SHBT to the highest conservation standards.

The proposed model will deliver social and economic benefits in the form of newly created, geographically accessible preapprenticeship opportunities for young people, additional capacity for local building trades through supported Modern Apprenticeship roles, CPD opportunities for contractors in heritage skills and retrofit, and community benefit in restored town centre buildings. Subject to securing future funding, the project is ready to go to the next stage of development for delivery of an on-site pilot in Eyemouth in early 2026.

# Project Summary:

Multiply, ran from September 2023 to the end of March 2025. This initiative was designed to enhance numeracy skills across various demographics. Various initiatives under the Multiply offered in the Scottish Borders were successful. In terms of qualifications and tuition, progress was made with learners achieving National 4 qualifications and making strides towards National 5 courses. Support for learners through one-on-one tuition and SQA qualifications was also achieved.

Grants were awarded to organisations promoting numeracyfocused projects within the community. Various programs, such as Rhythm and Numeracy courses for learners and support for parents with children's numeracy learning, have been successful and well engaged.

Other initiatives included a food growing program aimed at developing essential skills and a parental engagement program to support numeracy practices at home. Feedback from parents has led to the creation of a parental numeracy workbook to facilitate learning at home. Numeracy resource boxes were developed to provide essential tools for tutors and learners to enrich the learning process. These resources included materials such as concrete and pictorial aids, fraction tools, and necessary stationery.

- 82 courses were designed to increase confidence with numbers
- 18 courses delivered for parents wanting to increase numeracy skills
- 37 courses were aimed at encouraging people to upskill to access iobs/careers
- 6 courses were designed to help people use numeracy to manage money
- 27 adults achieved maths qualifications up to and including Level 2 equivalent
- 14 adults participated in maths qualifications and courses up to and including Level 2 equivalent
- 799 people participated in Multiply funded courses
