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# BACKGROUND ENGAGEMENT BOOKLET AND QUESTIONNAIRE

Scottish Borders Council is asking members of the public to submit their views on proposed Byelaws Prohibiting the Consumption of Alcohol in Designated Public Places.

The public engagement process is open until midnight on 17 January 2014.

#### WHAT DO THE BYELAWS MEAN?

#### The Byelaws would:

- provide an additional tool for the police to reduce anti-social behaviour through early intervention.
- allow the Council and its partners to meet the top priority of the Borders public, as identified in the 2008, 2009 and 2010 Scottish Borders Household Surveys, 'Making the Borders a safer place in which to live, work and visit'.
- help the Council and its partners to support the following five Licensing Objectives:
  - preventing crime and disorder
  - securing public safety
  - preventing public nuisance
  - protecting and improving public health
  - protecting children from harm.

# DESIGNATED PUBLIC PLACES

## SO DOES THIS MEAN THERE WOULD BE A PENALTY FOR DRINKING IN PUBLIC?

If Byelaws were implemented in certain areas of the Borders, the police would have the power to issue a fine of up to £500 if an individual was found to be consuming alcohol in a designated public place.

# WHAT ABOUT DRINKING DURING COMMON RIDINGS OR IN MY OWN BACK GARDEN?

#### The proposed Byelaws would NOT apply for:

- the Border Common Ridings and local Summer Festivals
- Hogmanay New Year's Eve
- licensed establishments e.g. beer gardens
- private homes e.g. back garden barbeques etc.

# DO OTHER AREAS OF SCOTLAND HAVE BYELAWS?

Scottish Borders Council is the only council in Scotland not to have such Byelaws in place. The Byelaws already apply in 480 towns and villages across Scotland.

# IN WHICH AREAS OF THE BORDERS WILL THE BYELAWS BE IMPLEMENTED?

The designated areas have not yet been determined. The Council is asking for your views on whether you think the Byelaws should only be applied to certain towns.

# WHO WAS INVOLVED IN DEVELOPING THE BYELAWS?

The proposed Byelaws are based on the National Model Byelaws. Officers from Scottish Borders Council, Alcohol and Drugs Partnership and Police Scotland have considered and developed these proposals.
