



ATTAINMENT: How are we performing?	Actions we are taking to improve or maintain performance
<p>The following information is taken from “Insight”, a national benchmarking tool used by schools and local authorities to compare attainment and achievement. Within Scottish Borders, we are seeing an improving picture for attainment overall, year on year, and we compare well nationally and to our “virtual” comparators (others similar to us). Below is a range of measures that show attainment in:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• National 5 English</li> <li>• National 5 Maths</li> <li>• National 5 Chemistry</li> <li>• Higher English</li> <li>• Higher Maths</li> <li>• Higher Chemistry</li> </ul> <p>There are also an additional measure around:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> <li>• Literacy and Numeracy</li> </ul>	<p>Within our Children and Young People’s service, we are analysing the data that is now available to us through the “Insight” tool- by school; by subject; by gender; for Looked After Children; for children within our most deprived areas; for pupils with Additional Support Needs etc.</p> <p>From this analysis, schools will produce action plans which will then allow us to target support. We will also share good practice and develop partnerships to enhance the learning experience. There is a strong focus on sharing good practice, and schools are developing partnerships to enhance the learning experience for all learners.</p>


Attainment in National 5 English: % of resulted entries

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### Attainment in Higher English: % of resulted entries




The graph presents Scottish Borders attainment in **Higher English**. It shows Scottish Borders attainment against national attainment since 2011.

The % of pupils attaining at Grade A and B in the Scottish Borders is increasing year on year (now 62.3%) and is above the Scottish average (51.51%).

The % receiving no award is reducing (now 10.54%) and is below the Scottish average (13.21%).

### Attainment in Higher Maths: % of resulted entries




The graph presents Scottish Borders attainment in **Higher Maths**. It shows Scottish Borders attainment against national attainment since 2011.

The % of pupils attaining at Grades A and B has reduced slightly (now 44.78%) but is similar to the Scottish average (44.95%). However, the % of pupils attaining grades A-D (now 82.97%) is slightly above the Scottish average (80.76%).

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
### Attainment in Higher Chemistry: % of resulted entries

The % of pupils attaining grades A and B has remained steady over the last 3 years (now 55.73%) and is ahead of the national figure (48.45%)

### % of candidates attaining Literacy and Numeracy



The % of candidates attaining literacy and numeracy has improved steadily in Scottish Borders since 2013 at both Levels 4 and 5, and is only marginally behind our virtual comparator.
