- Esme, diagnosed with Asperger's Syndrome, suffers from panic and anxiety and felt unable to attend school and as a result has been home-educated. 2 years with VOMO has developed her confidence and self-esteem
- Emily is a 17 year-old transgender woman who has recently begun the transition process, having attended VOMO for several months before. "I felt that VOMO was the first place I could truly be myself." The team has worked hard to create a safe and open environment
- Dylan was referred to VOMO from school. Since joining, his skills have increased enabling him to produce quality work within a group. As well as creating his own music he is now teaching other young people





She uses traditional, craft-based processes in conjunction with digital and responsive technologies. Sarah has received support through CABN over a number of years, including one to one advice and attendance at CABN run networking events.

**ELISE ALDEN** (pen name) writes edgy contemporary and historical romance, and science fiction. When Elise first made contact with CABN in 2013, she was a busy mum of two young children, but had completed a creative writing course, and written an initial draft of her first novel. Since 2013, her journey to becoming a successful fulltime writer, earning her living from commercial fiction, has been fast and furious, and has been supported by CABN, including from CABN Literature Advocate (and professional writer) Jules Horne.

'If it was not for the support offered by Jules, and the wider support available via CABN, Elise does not think she would be published.'

#### **BORDERS LIVE TOURING**

Border Live Touring (BLT) is a rural touring scheme funded by Creative Scotland and Heart of Hawick. It provides rural communities across the region with a wide range of high quality, professional touring performances which are brought to local halls and venues.


