# what are local citizens panels (LCPs)?

## LCPs are meetings where you can:



- find out what is going on in your community
- work with others to make your community better
- tell people what you want
- listen to what other members think
- listen to speakers
- have your say about what should happen in the future
- hear about work the Learning Disability Service and others are doing to support people with learning disabilities and family carers
- help make services better.

### who can join?



#### you can join your local LCP if you:

- live in the Scottish Borders
- are aged 14+ and have a learning disability
- or you care for someone who has a learning disability.

# how many local citizens panels are there?



#### there are 5 LCPs:

- Berwickshire
- Kelso and Coldstream
- Hawick and Jedburgh
- Galashiels and Selkirk
- Tweeddale

## how often do local citizens panels meet?

# how do LCP meetings work?



- you will be sent an agenda and papers for the meeting
- you must bring these to the meeting
- LCP meetings last for 2 hours
- we have a coffee break in the middle
- the LCP co-ordinator writes the notes from the meeting. We call these the minutes.



LCP meetings are very welcoming and informal



 you get a chance to talk about things that are important to you



 you listen to other members about things that are important to them



- you might agree to do something after the meeting
   This is called an action.
- if you need support to do your action you can get help
- when you come to the next meeting you tell everyone what you have done.



#### If you need support to be an LCP member we can:

- look at the best way to support you
- ask other LCP members to help
- look for training
- ask staff to help you.



LCPs are part of the governance structure of the Learning Disability Service.

The LCPs are asked to talk about things as part of the work of the Learning Disability Service.

# taking part in LCPs

## rules you need to know



- there must be 5 LCP members for the LCP meeting to start
- one of these people must be the Chair or Vice-chair
- the panels work best if members come to all their LCP meetings.



 it is important you let us know if you cannot come to a meeting



make sure you get to the meeting on time



- turn off your mobile phone or
- put your mobile phone on silent.



you will be given 2 cards at meetings when people are talking use your **red** card to say "**please stop talking – I do not understand**".



when people are talking use your **green** card to say "I want to speak".

# what happens if lots of members want to speak at the same time?



- the Chairperson will keep track of whose turn it is to speak
- they will tell you when it is your turn to speak.

# when it is your turn to speak



- speak up so everyone can hear you
- speak clearly.

# what happens during a discussion?



#### LCP members:

- respect other people's views
- listen to other people when they are speaking
- only talk about agenda items
- put their own point of view across in a calm way.

# if you do not agree with other people when they are speaking:



- please do not make a face
- please do not make a noise.



- there will be a coffee break during the meeting
- you will be able to eat and drink during the coffee break
- please do not eat or drink at other times in the meeting.



- please do not leave before the meeting finishes
- you can leave the meeting early if you have agreed this with the Chairperson.

# who is who – and what do they do?

### **Local Citizens Panel Co-ordinator**



#### what does the Co-ordinator do?

- organises panel meetings
- sends out letters, agendas and minutes of meetings
- writes minutes of meetings
- asks speakers to come to meetings
- answers any questions you have about the panels
- signs up new members.

# what do Local Area Co-ordinators and Community Link Workers do?



#### they can help you to:

- have your voice heard
- use your skills and build your confidence
- make your own choices about the kind of life you want
- help change things for the better where you live
- find out about what is going on where you live
- take part in activities or events that interest you
- support family carers
- find out how to make healthy changes to your life
- build friendships and relationships.

# The Local Area Co-ordinators and Community Link Workers support the LCPs. They:

- provide support to the Chairperson before the meeting,
   at the meeting and after the meeting
- bring a report about the work they are doing
- support LCP members to do actions after the meeting.

### support workers



#### some panel members have a support worker.

- members can bring their support worker to a panel meeting
- the support worker helps the person take part in the meeting
- support workers are not allowed to speak about their own views at panel meetings
- they have to be neutral (not take sides).

### what do the LCP Chairs and Vice Chairs do?



- get ready for meetings
- make sure that LCP meetings run well
- make sure everyone keeps to the rules
- make sure everyone has a chance to talk
- make sure meetings run to time
- welcome and thank speakers at meetings
- sometimes represent LCPs at other meetings
- sometimes be a spokesperson for LCPs
- work with the LCP Co-ordinator, Local Area Coordinators and Community Link Workers.

### guest speakers at LCP meetings



Panel members decide who they want to invite to their meetings.

The person they invite is called a guest speaker.

- guest speakers talk about things that members think are important
- guest speakers usually have 20 minutes to speak
- sometimes they are given more time
- LCP members can ask the guest speakers questions.

# links to other groups



LCP members are sometimes invited to be a representative on other meetings in Scottish Borders Council or NHS Borders.



- representatives talk about things that are important to other members
- representatives will tell LCP members about what happened at the other groups.

## one group is called the easy read group



- the easy read group meets a few times a year
- the easy read group helps to make papers and reports easier to understand
- they do not use long words or words that might be hard to understand.

## one group is called the charging forum



- the charging forum meets a few times a year
- the charging forum makes comments and suggestions on the Council's charging policy for social care
- the charging forum gives advice on leaflets and letters so people get clear information about their charge.

# one group is called the Policy and Strategy Group



The policy and strategy group meets 4 times a year.

1 LCP member is part of this group

#### This group is responsible for:

- finding out about national strategies like Keys to Life and others
- telling the Partnership Board when strategies and policies change
- checking the progress on the Learning Disability
   Service work plan
- checking the progress of the Providers Group work plan
- this group sends a report to the Partnership Board.

# one group is called the Learning Disability Partnership Board



The Board meets 6 times a year.

2 LCP members are part of the Board.




#### The Board is responsible for:

- checking that everyone is working together for people with learning disabilities and their carers
- checking that people are following the national strategies like Keys to Life and others
- checking that people are following the rules for safe and person centred support
- checking that people are making improvements in the way they work
- sharing good news stories and letting people know when we can do better
- sending information to NHS Borders and Scottish
   Borders Council about what we do.

This diagram shows the different groups that make up the Learning Disability Service governance structure.

The arrows show that groups are linked and talk to each other.
