I write to ask if SBC would consider the following proposal, from the Friends of Kelso Museum:

Proposal-

To plant an orchard of 30-40 fruit trees in one or both of the small and vacant green spaces at the foot of Mayfield Lane (ie at the entrance to Klondyke Garden Centre and east of the Glebe field).

Rationale-

To re-create a small area of what was once Kelso Abbey Orchard in medieval times. The Abbey Orchard and Gardens would have extended along the entire length of Mayfield from the 12th to 15th Centuries. (See attached map of Kelso from 1823 – Appendix 1).

Method-

Under the Community Empowerment (Scotland) Bill, to seek to form a partnership of Kelso community groups that would apply for funding to purchase the fruit trees and plant the orchard and then to rent the site from SBC, on a long term lease for a nominal fee.

Maintenance-

The community groups would be responsible for ongoing tree and grass maintenance.

Endorsements-

Kelso Community Council endorsed the proposal at their evening meeting held on Tuesday 14th March 2017.
