The Ettrick and Yarrow Community Development Company is in the process of buying the Ettrick Marshes and part of Gamescleuch Forest which is within one mile of Ettrick School. We propose to use the school as our office base for 3 part-time members of staff and our volunteers. One classroom currently hosts the permanent James Hogg Exhibition which opens from June to September and attracts around 300 visitors every summer, many of them from overseas. This is currently maintained by a small volunteer group who would be helped by another community group using the building. The second classroom would be brought back into use for office space, training, and additional local heritage projects and displays. We successfully ran a 6 week James Hogg Creative Residency several years ago and we intend to run more residencies and creative workshops using the school. We also intend to hire electric bikes and promote cycling routes in the surrounding area from a base at the school.

The kitchen area needs a lot of attention but could potentially provide an outlet for teas and coffees for visitors as well as use by staff. The car park is used for events in the village hall as well as the school and we would like to secure its continued use for both facilities. Ettrick School is 20 miles from Selkirk and we have not identified any other office space for purchase or rent within this 20 mile radius and we need to have a base close to the forest. The car park and gardens flood several times per year and we would want to investigate actions to prevent this frequency. The building is damp and the electric heating system is very outdated and we would want to address this at a future point. We will also have to install satellite broadband to create a usable office base.

We would make our office facilities available to other members of the community as required and see the reopening of Ettrick school as returning a community hub to the village.

Benefits of the proposal

The upper Ettrick valley has suffered from changing demographics as hill farms have been sold to forestry and house prices have outstripped local incomes. The closure of the school was a blow to the community as it removed several local jobs and makes the upper valley less attractive for families in future. The community benefits of this asset transfer would be to keep the school building and grounds available for community use. It will enable 3 part time jobs to be based in the community as well as helping to facilitate a number of other income generating projects which are linked to the proposed forest purchase. It will enable several initiatives which are aimed at attracting more visitors to the area and thereby help to sustain existing businesses important to the community like the village shop and the local inn.

The Ettrick and Yarrow Community Development Company now has over 200 members within the valleys and we run a range of projects aimed at improving the quality of life for all residents and helping to sustain businesses. Our overall aim is to provide opportunities to support people continuing to live and work in the Ettrick and Yarrow valleys. The asset transfer of Ettrick school will give us a base from which to continue our projects and is integral to our plans for managing the forest for the benefit of the community.

We have documented the ways in which this overall project contributes to the 16 National Outcomes and we can provide this on request.

Asset transfer will also allow the James Hogg Exhibition to continue in situ thereby protecting an important and valued heritage resource for the area.

We are not aware of any restrictions beyond the location on a flood plain which makes the site vulnerable to river flooding as well as ingress from the hill burn which runs behind the property. We assume that this would make residential planning consent unlikely within the school grounds but would not prevent the continued daytime use of the building as an office, exhibition space and for community purposes.

The EYCDC has a strong and experienced board of local residents with a range of professional expertise as well as being able to draw on a large membership. This is detailed in our business plan. We do not intend to carry out any major changes to the structure of the building but hope to work with SBC prior to any transfer on a number of necessary repairs.

We will use the income generated from our forest management to cover core costs of operating from the school building, staff and operational expenses. This is all included in our ten year cash flow.

The EYCDC has 200 members with the Ettrick and Yarrow valleys, the majority of these residents have joined within the last year as a result of discussions around our project to buy the Ettrick Marshes and surrounding forest and create a base in Ettrick school. We have run a number of public meetings and engagement events to publicise our plans and to gather feedback over the last year.

To quantify support for the project we gathered signatures within the upper Ettrick area during July this year. There are 140 people registered to vote in the Boston Hall which is opposite Ettrick primary school. A small group of volunteers visited every household within a 6 mile radius to make sure everyone was fully aware of the proposal. 112 people signed to show their support which is an 80% vote in favour. Some people were working away from home or not available so we know that the number of people in support is actually higher. This petition is available to view on request.

We also have letters of support for the wider forest purchase and associated plans from both the Ettrick and Yarrow Community Council and the Ettrick and Yarrow Tourism Association. We also received a letter of support from the Convenor on behalf of SBC for the wider project of buying the Ettrick Marshes and part of Gamescleuch Forest.

Purchase Price - EYCDC own funds

These core costs will be covered by income generated from annual timber sales as detailed in our business plan.

Donations from visitors to the James Hogg exhibition will continue to contribute to the running costs of publicising and maintaining the exhibition.
