Title of Proposal:	Scottish Borders Council Proposed Local Development Plan 2020 (Proposed LDP)
What is it?	A new Policy/Strategy/Practice x A revised Policy/Strategy/Practice □
Description of the proposal:	The Proposed LDP has been prepared to guide the future use and development of land within the Scottish Borders. It sets out a series of policies and proposals indicating where development can or should not take place and provides guidance on the future provision of a range of subjects including housing, business and industrial use, transport, infrastructure and recreation. It seeks to deliver sustainability and promote a low carbon economy, promote health and wellbeing, promote economic growth, regenerate town centres and give protection to the built and natural heritage. To further the promotion of the objective to ensure high standards of building design and site layouts, development proposals must adhere to the principles laid out in the Council's Supplementary Planning Guidance on

	'Placemaking and Design', 2010. The Proposed LDP provides a broad vision for the period up to 2031, with a focus on the period up to 2026. Key aims and objectives are:
	 To provide an adequate range and quality of land and premises for business and industry; To protect strategically important business opportunities; To promote the development and regeneration of town centres; To provide a generous supply land for mainstream and affordable housing; To encourage better connectivity by transport and digital networks; To protect and enhance the natural and built environment; To protect important open space; To promote green network linkages around towns; To integrate climate change adaptation requirements such as flood prevention and renewable energy production; and To make adequate provision for waste management.

Preliminary Note:

Planning in its general approach and from a national level, actively seeks to ensure that the general character and amenity of rural places is protected from any development which in its nature or scale, would be more appropriately accommodated in existing settlements. As such, there is an acceptance in these terms at least, that certain developments (e.g. larger housing proposals; new business and industrial areas) are more reasonably and appropriately directed towards settlements. This has practical implications for the numbers and types of housing and employment opportunities that may be available in rural localities relative to settlements. While demand for housing, employment and services in rural areas tends to be lower due to lower population numbers, there is nonetheless potential for disproportionate impacts upon younger people, older people, disabled people, and anyone who has difficulty accessing private transport, or who requires some level of care or assistance. Public Consultation, over a defined 12 week period, currently intended to start in late October 2020. The Lead Officer with the Plans and Research Team will be managing the process, which is to be carried out online, due to ongoing Covid-19 restrictions.

A Public Consultation was previously held to collect responses to the Main Issues Report (MIR). This took place between November 2018 and January 2019. The responses to the consultation on the MIR have informed the preparation of the Proposed Local Development Plan, and the ways in which specific responses have been taken on board within the preparation of the Proposed Local Development Plan are set out within supporting documents, which will be made available to the public at the time of the public consultation.
